Lee's award was an encased American flag that was flown over the Capital in his honor. Lee, Pete Brintnall, Bob Treadway and I started the program and Jack Gordon joined later. The WWMP has helped hundreds of wounded, injured and ill Army soldiers, and a number of Air Force, Navy and Marines get internships while at Walter Reed Hospital, take online and in-person courses to further their education, apply for VA benefits and get jobs after they retire from their military Service. This was done through our mentorship program that expanded to Ft. Belvoir, Ft Lee, VA (where **Tony Nadal** with local classmates started their program), and Brooke Army Medical Center, TX. It involved recruiting and training over 200 mentors, mainly West Pointers, that worked with their soldier on a one- on -one basis throughout their stay at the hospitals and many continued helping them after they got out of Walter Reed. Lee and I have now retired and have turned the program over to a younger, motivated group of West Pointers and other Officers".

The Fort is unique in that it housed both Japanese Americans from the West Coast and POWs from Europe and Japan. The Fort also has a remarkable collection of Army vehicles and large combat weapons, beautifully maintained and displayed."
