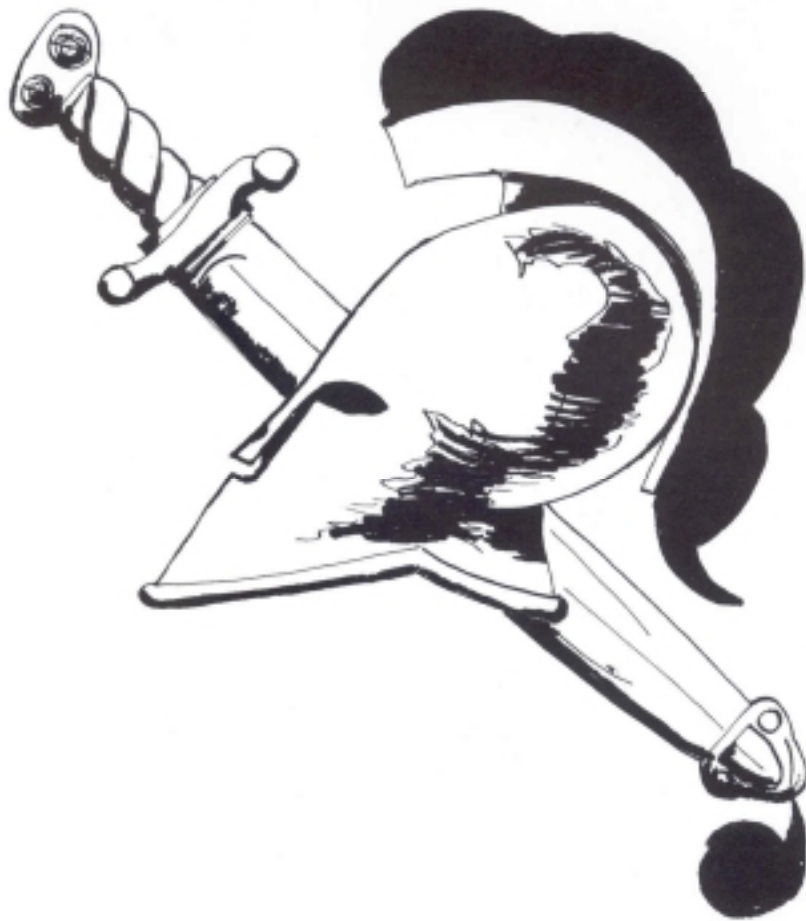
DEAN'S LIST

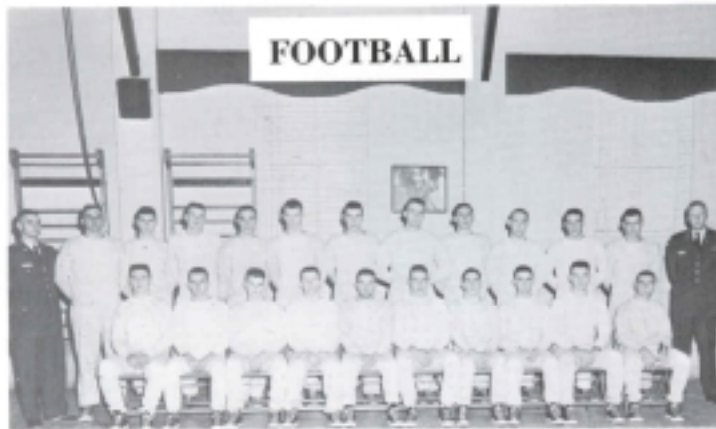
BASKETBALL

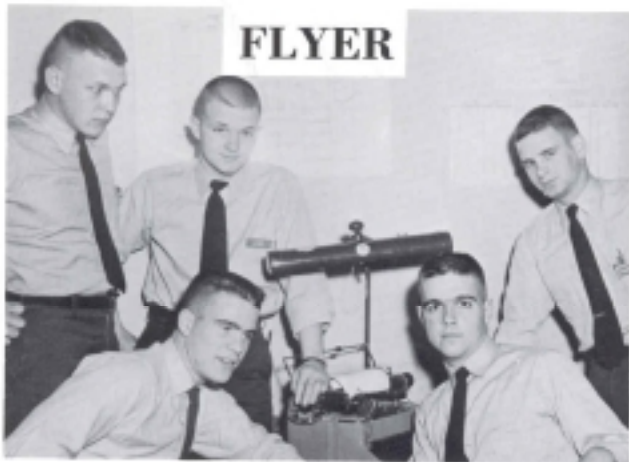
