As of Labor Day, the construction of the retractable enclosure over the patio of the Club is nearly complete. The enclosure itself is complete. Still to be accomplished are:

- (1) decorating the concrete floor of the enclosure with black and gold flakes over a gray base, a 6' USMA logo and a couple of 4' Firstie uniform insignia (i.e., the black bust of Pallas) and
- (2) installing handrails to comply with code requirements. If the weather cooperates, this work should be completed by mid-September.

We held the customary handover of the First Class Club on 16 Aug. As usual, we had a packed house from the class of 2013, and, as usual, the incoming Firsties were most grateful that the great class of '58 had shown the creativity and foresight, now 19 years ago, to endow West Point with such a well-appreciated facility that will enhance their final year.

What was unusual this year was the enthusiasm of the class of '13 concerning the Firstie Club. Every year, the incoming Firsties are grateful, but '13 was over the top. Once we finished the brief handover ceremony, a long line of Firsties, led by First Captain Brandon Whittington (from El Paso, defensive back on football team, Mech E major) and the class president (Tim Berry), trooped up to the stage to shake the hand of every '58er present. That's never happened before.

In addition, the class of '13 has appointed two Firsties to act as "liaison to the Firstie Club". Before we left for the evening, one of them pulled Jack Bradshaw, Dale Hruby, and me aside to discuss with great enthusiasm their plans for the Club for the coming year.

In addition to Jack, who made some well-chosen and well-received remarks on behalf of the class, and Dale, others in attendance were Dodie Hruby, Butch and Merrilyn Saint, Doug Sedgwick, Brad Johnson, Munge Moore, and, of course, Bonnie.

As many of you know, the Wounded Warrior Mentor Program was founded in 2004 at Walter Reed by Pete Brintnall, John Herren, Bob Tredway (deceased and missed) and Lee Miiller. Our mission is to assist Wounded Warriors and their spouses via a one on one combat veteran mentor to a new productive life and profession with a three to five year horizon with the pillars of the organization being education, internships and jobs. We also have a follow-on mentor program with mentors in waiting all around the country to enable the transition of the mentorship to a follow-on mentor anywhere in the US and Puerto Rico, when the WW and family go home.

We have grown to approximately 350 mentors mentoring about 400 Wounded Warriors (800 successfully mentored over the past eight years) with programs at the new Walter Reed National Military Medical Center, Ft Belvoir and Ft Meade and with outreach program established at Brooke AMC in San Antonio, Ft Gordon, the VA Richmond Poly Trauma Center, the Marines at Kaneohe Bay, HI and lastly Ft Eustis (founded and run by Tony Nadal). We are a 501(c)3 with virtual offices and are all volunteers with no one on the payroll. Although the Class of '58 founded the organization for which we are very proud, our mentors come from all academies, all services, ranks and genders. Likewise with the Wounded Warriors and military families we assist. Our mentor ranks remain heavily laced with classmates and West Pointers, many in leadership positions this support greatly appreciated.

Up to this point we have basically funded the operation from our own pockets. We do have administrative expenses such as printing, office supplies for the organization as a whole etc. We have recently learned that some of you have been contributing regular to the Wounded Warrior Project, a huge organization with a budget of \$40 million (40% overhead) and all paid employees. We work hand in hand with this organization but they complement our efforts by organizing events, trips, providing plane tickets, setting up and running schools for IT etc. They do not provide a one on one mentor to any extent for the Wounded Warriors. They are nationally known with publicity and fund raising. We work with them and appreciate what they do but we are not in the business of initiating and supporting events, we are in the business of mentoring Wounded Warriors. The bottom line is we are asking that you identify with the Wounded Warrior Mentor Program, our Cl of 58 sponsored organization, and if you are so inclined to contribute to our mentoring Program.
