

Administrivia Factoids

4/13/2018

Some administrivia about the class for those who may have forgotten these factoids. We had 573 who graduated in June 1958 on three different days – 4 June (570), 5 June (one – **Bruce Davenport**, who died 21 Oct 2011) and 7 June (two -- **Jack Tierney**, who died 3 Jan 2010) and **Mark Sigurski**). An observation, the First Regiment did not do well with respect to graduating late, after 4 June. All three were First Regiment files. Scribe remembers well Jack Tierney's remark that "I was the first man in my class." Of course, the last man to graduate on 7 June 1958 was Mark Sigurski. If Jack was first man in his class, Mark was the second man. I believe that Mark also was our first battery commander in the class. His was an Air Defense battery in the Baltimore area. And, Mark was also among the first to resign on 31 Aug 1961 according to the Army Times of 6 Sep 1961 and the 1962 Register of Graduates and Former Cadets. Scribe is simply trying to impress you all with my years-old data.

In fact, our last man in by his class standing was **Bill Kelley** who graduated on 4 June 1958 before Bruce (5 June) and before Jack and Mark (both on 7 June). Bill Kelley went into the Air Force and later resigned as a captain in 1965 before going on to become a Captain with Continental Airlines. The bottom man to serve a full career was **Buck Griffin** (who died 10 Sep 2011). Buck resigned in 1964 as a captain and then returned to active duty and served a full career, retiring as a colonel in 1985. Too many of those who graduated at the bottom have left us too soon. We are fortunate that Bill Kelley and Mark Sigurski are still with us.

We all know the first man in the class was **George Walker**. Sadly, George died in an aircraft accident on 31 Jan 1959 after Ranger School. He was enroute to West Point for the wedding of **Dodie & Dale Hruby**. As you can imagine, the accident was hard on the wedding. Meanwhile, another three of the top five men in the class also left us too soon. In addition to George Walker, we have lost **Dan Brookhart** (second man: who died 12 Nov 1963), **Jim Hall** (fourth man and my roommate First Class year: who died 22 Aug 2015) and **Dick Groves** (fifth man, who died 6 Mar 2006). I am happy to report that **Tony Smith** (third man) is still vertical. He is a regular at DC social gatherings with his lovely wife, Bonnie. Bottom line, we have one of the top five and two of the bottom five still with us. Only three of ten. Not good. Time to be thankful that you (we) were not among the very top (lost four of five) or very bottom (lost three of five) of the class.

As well as graduating over three days in 1958, we graduated over three years or three classes as well: 1958 - 573, 1959 - 29 and 1960 - one). And, we also entered over three years. The first who entered in 1952 was **Bud Davenport**, a turn-back from 1956. Bud was our first six-year man ('56, '57 and '58). I am happy to report that Bud is still with us. There were 21 turn-backs who joined us from 1957 (not sure I can name them all, therefore, Scribe will not even try) who entered in 1953. Another six-year man was **Tom Fletcher**, a turn-back from 1957 who then graduated in 1959. The mathematically gifted realize that Tom was in three classes ('57, '58 and '59). Sadly, Tom died on 22 Sep 98. We entered 752 in July 1954 and graduated 551 in June

1958 (plus Bud from '56 and the other 21 turn-backs from '57) which makes 573 total grads in June 1958. 

Classmates—

Not much left of December and year 2017 – however, we do have 12 days of Christmas and there are (were when I had to split Part 1) 7 remaining. And, Christmas is a good place to start these notes. Merry Christmas to all and best wishes for the New Year. And, the New Year will include our 60th Reunion: 26-29 April 2018. BE THERE FOR THE 60TH. I still find it difficult to believe that we graduated almost 60 years ago. Allow me to repeat: BE THERE FOR THE 60TH.

Our Losses

Of course, deaths of classmates and wives make the passage of time all too real. Sadly, I must begin with death of another classmate: **Edward Vincent DeBoesser Jr E1** -- Vince to all of us. Reality creeps into these notes all too often. Vince died on 17 Nov 2017. His widow, **Anne**, was one of our June Ladies. According to my class roster, they lived in Gettysburg PA. Vince was an artilleryman who retired as a colonel in 1988. You can look up his Register entry by his Cullum #21911. Our paths did not cross over our time in the Army as soldiers. Vince left the Pentagon as I entered in 1976. Close only counts in horseshoes and hand grenades. I hope the E1 CCQ was able to provide more information to their company-mates.

This is a good place to mention that we classmates should communicate information about deaths with **Jack Downing H2**, our CINC for death information. You can always copy me on emails to Jack about the death of a classmate (or wife). And, of course, we should be in touch with CCQs and company-mates. Jack will then communicate the information to the class and the West Point Association of Graduates (WPAOG).

The subject of marching at the opening ceremonies for the AFA, temporarily established at Lowrey Field near Denver, came up. I reminisced that 5th Company from Camp Buckner

was sent there along with our color guard (John was in the color guard). Anyway, Bob sent us all the following photo via email. Bob, Alan and I were on the trip section to AFA at Lowrey AFB along with John and the rest of our Color Guard. And, of course, all the other classmates from 5th Company.

Quoting from Bob's (Dusty's) email: "John, Alan, George, Jerry and Van; I believe the ceremonies were held during the summer of 1955. Note two Constellations and one F-86 on the tarmac. Dusty aka Bob. PS: I enjoyed our lunch together today. Thanks for setting it up." In the opinion of your Scribe, John Schroeder needs to come north from Atlanta area more often!

More on the AFA trip in the summer of 1955

Note the cadets in upper right of photo in FD over white trou. The Middies were behind us. They were class of 1957 and tried to pull rank on us. No way, Jose! However, in those days the Middies were truly senior to us – strange, but true! Let me explain. Cadets USMA were then the junior warrant officers in the Army. Meanwhile, the Midshipmen USNA were the senior

warrant officers in Navy. Therefore, in fact they were senior to us. My father class of '36 pointed this out to me. I wrote the Com a letter about this injustice. No reply from then-BG Messinger. This Scribe has no clue where cadets actually rank today. I have always preferred the ranking from our Plebe Knowledge: What do plebes rank? "Sir, the Superintendent's dog, the Commandant's cat, the waiters in the Mess Hall, the Hell Cats, and all the Admirals in the whole blamed Navy" (pretty sure that in H2 plebes said "whole damned Navy). Dusty aka Bob came up with this photo immediately after lunch. Amazing.

Buckner 5th Co had a grand trip to Colorado, but making up the missed training took its toll. Our Tac was a miserable USAF officer (not a grad). He was later relieved from being Tac of a lettered company (E2? I think. Cannot remember.) Anyway, we had an inspection on first Saturday after returning to Buckner the AFA ceremonies. We looked terrible. Dirty gear, rifles, etc. Out outgoing Tac praised us for our work to prepare for the inspection along with making up the missed training. Then, after the incoming USAF Tac took over, he told us how sorry we were. My '56 platoon leader, Jack Woodmansee, as I recall, kept telling us he wanted to take the first weekend to NYC. He lost it due to demerits from the miserable USAF Tac. The Tac kept using honor to give the Firsties a difficult time at Buckner and back at West Point. I was not sorry he was relieved of his duties. Memories...

Class Ring Melt. As you all know, the class ring melt wherein gold from earlier class rings is incorporated into the gold for new class rings is a program begun by our own **Ron Turner K1** (he wrote an article for Assembly originating the idea). I think that gold from prior rings was used first for the class rings for class of 2002. A "lump" of gold is saved each year to be used in the gold for the next year's class. Net effect is that rings include gold from all the prior rings donated. Anyway, here is an email from WPAOG to our President **Jack Bradshaw M2** about rings melted this year for the class of 2019:

An email from **Joe Shea I2** had further info about Tom: "I remember **'Tiger' Orr** from USMAPS '53/54. As I recall Tom had been in combat during the Korean War. He had a friend who was at USMAPS with us but didn't get into West Point. I believe they had served together. The friend always joshed Tom about being in 'Graves Registration.' I believe it was he who

gave Tom the moniker! At that time Tom was a shy man of few words. **Brad Eliot G2** may remember more."

Scribe's addition to the foregoing: Joe is the second Joe Shea in our class. He is one of our class who loved West Point so much that he extended for fifth year and graduated in 1959. As you will remember, the other **Joe Shea L1** who graduated in June 1958, departed our ranks on 31 Aug 2016.

An email from **Palmer McGrew I2** provided further info about Tiger Tom: "Plebe year, when we had early morning PE, and used gym lockers assigned to us, I came in one morning to find 'my locker' all decorated for my apparent locker mate, Tom Orr. I had never met Tom, I had no idea that guys from the other regiment also used "our lockers", and what is it with this locker decorating, anyway? Though I hadn't met Tom Orr I was impressed that our classmates would go to the trouble of decorating his locker and calling him 'Tiger Tom Orr.' I did meet him at the Bar Harbor mini and had long conversations with him. Never saw him again. If his company mates who decorated his locker are still around, please post an obit for him on the obit web site. RIP Tiger Tom."

More on the funeral of Vince DeBoesser

More on the funeral of **Vince DeBoesser** via an email to Scribe from attendee **Joe Schwar I2**. "According to **Anne DeBoeser**, Vince had been ill for about six months. In and out of hospitals with a number of unexplained complaints which, again according to Anne, just wore his system down until it just quit. Neither **Kathy** nor I had much time to talk to Anne so this will be skimpy and much of it second or third hand. Vince died on November 17th. The service was held at St Mary's Catholic Church in Fairfield, PA, a very small town about eight miles west of Gettysburg, on November 25th. He will be cremated (according to the funeral director). Burial will be at Arlington at some time in the future. As an aside, Fairfield was the site of some skirmishing as Lee retreated from the battle at Gettysburg.

"I didn't know, until the priest talked about it, how religious Vince was and how active he was in the small catholic community in Fairfield. Last I knew their mailing address was Gettysburg so was surprised at the location of the service, but his obit stated they lived in Gettysburg. There were four classmates in attendance. In addition to Kathy and me, there were George & Barbara Yurick A1, Bob & Ann Marie Donovan E1, Bill Serchak K1 and his daughter (Bridget: spelling?). There were at least two other West Pointers (classes in the mid-80s) from Northern Virginia who had presumably served with Vince at some point, but don't quote me on that. The priest seemed to be impressed that classmates attended the service and commented on that as being representative of the bonds existing among members of the military. Ironically the priest's name was DiTommaso. I meant to follow up with him to see if there was a connection, but, alas, I did not.

"The mass was followed by a short ceremony outside the church by a local color guard. Did the folding of the flag and presentation to Anne. Even had a firing party. Nothing like Arlington but surprising that it all got pulled together in such a small town. Reminded me of something out of a Norman Rockwell painting -- and I don't mean that as a put down. People who were there and participated in any way because they knew and respected Vince and Anne. About what I've come to expect in small town Pennsylvania. We classmates all talked about the fact that the class flag was not present. No one knew what had happened or why it was missing. I doubt that anyone but us would have known enough to even miss it.

"Now a little history. **Anne DeBoeser** was one of the 'girls' that traveled from Philadelphia to West Point frequently when we were cadets. Among the group, in addition to Pat, were **Lois Deely, Barbara Bellows**, and **Peggy Hankee** (all their married names). Seems that there may have been one more, but... I always admired how that group of women hung in there with such a bunch of reprobates. Undoubtedly, we were better men because of them. I've got to quit before I get too melancholy and forget what my purpose in this note is. Hope this is helpful. Joe"

Scribe's additional information: **Pat Schwar**, mentioned in the email, was Joe's first wife who was a cancer victim in March 1997. Joe subsequently married **Kathy Stevens (Schwar)**.

Scribe was exchanging emails with **George Lawton G2**, one was about the **H1 Robertsons**, George & Gale. Lawton wrote: "George & Gale are at the Fairfax near Belvoir. I saw son Russ Robertson Tuesday nite at the PEF board meeting and he'd been with his parents all day at the Fairfax. They moved there this past summer. John & Carol Devens (also H1) live just across the courtyard from the Robertsons." Company-mates as neighbors – is this a great life, or what? In the process I got the younger George Robertson's '82 email Scribe is in a lunch group with some veterans of our Pentagon war years circa 1976-1980 or so. There are only a few classmates in this group (Van Van Fleet M2 and Andy Andreson G1 come to mind). One member of the group sent me an email about some parasite that VN veterans are having problems with. I dutifully sent it to the Class Forum and received this reply from **Tom Morgan A2**: "Perhaps we are too old to die from this VN disease? - Time of Possession: Army ranks #4; Navy is #2
- 3rd Down Conversions: Army is #2 with 59 out of 115 tries; Navy is #7 with 55 of 113.
- 4th Down Conversions: Army is #16 with 14 of 21 tries; Navy is #26 with 10 of 16
- Tackles for Loss Allowed: Army is #3 at 3.22/game; Navy is #17 with 4.38

"And here's my favorite! Sacks Allowed: Army leads the nation with fewest sacks allowed - a grand total of 1 in 9 games this season! (If you never throw a pass, you can truly eliminate the sacks.) Navy is #14 in this stat. Seriously, the stats tell a story. Army is playing disciplined football (few penalties) and minimizing miscues (fumbles lost, tackles for loss)). TOF's TIPS #84

11/8/2017

Scribe is still on a roll. **TOF's TIPS #84 re SLEEP** – How much is enough? "This tip and the last three, were topics suggested by several of you. I'm always open for topics.

"Bottom line -- for adults 65+ you need 7-8 hours of sleep per night. The National Sleep Foundation states that 35% of all adults get less than 7 hours. Their study showed an average of 6 hrs, 45 mins during the week.

"UNHEALTHY BEHAVIOR CAN OCCUR DUE TO HAVING JUST A LITTLE SLEEP. Examples are mood swings, grogginess, and weight gain.

"Take a test---by going to bed at the same time...do not set alarm clock. See how many hours you sleep. Try this for several days. After this test, you can determine your sleep cycle.

"If you are sleep deprived, a nap can be awesome to improve your mood, alertness, memory retention, and overall performance. A NASA study reveals that a 40 minute nap increases

alertness by 100%. They try this with astronauts. Even a 6-minute nap can improve your memory retention.

"I've never napped but ardent nappers were JFK, Churchill, Edison, and Napoleon. (Your Scribe is a napper!)

"An optimal nap according to experts is 90 minutes, taken between 1-3pm. For ways to get to sleep and sleep soundly see TIP# 79. (per Scribe, #79 is not included here)

"One additional suggestion is to not have caffeine or other sleep disruptive meds 6 hours before bedtime. Check with your Doc... some meds should be taken in the morning because a side effect could be sleep disturbance.

Joe's daughter Jennifer had orchestrated the entire weekend with dinners, a tour of the Academy, a cruise on the Hudson and myriad other activities. They had decided that Joe would have wanted happiness and celebration not sadness.

TOF's TIPS #86

11/8/2017

TOF's TIPS #86 is quoted here: "As we get older, we lose our sense of taste and we lack our appetite. Even our sense of smell diminishes. Some people only take small bites even if it's their favorite food. Patty's Mom ate 2 or 3 bites of food at the Assisted Living facility or when we took her out to a restaurant. She became frail and loss a lot of weight. It was hard to watch her deteriorate.

"Some of the reasons for this problem are: ulcers, dementia, thyroid disease, depression, ill-fitting dentures (causing difficulty in chewing). Swallowing can be a problem too. All of these issues impair a sense of hunger. Another consideration is that chemotherapy kills off most of the taste buds. And a person may have a touchy digestive system.

- "Basically, you or whoever it is, needs a medical evaluation to ascertain what is causing the loss of interest in food. Also, your Doc needs to determine whether supplements you take interfere with your meds. If you are trying to get someone to buck up their eating ability, here are my suggestions:
- Go for a high-fat, high calories diet. This is based on my research. For the general population, a low-fat, low-calorie diet is recommended. But for seniors, becoming frail and/or losing weight...go for higher fat and calories.
- Eggs (7 grams protein per egg), peanut butter (2 tbls = 8 grams protein), cheese, fruits, dried fruits, nuts, raw veggies, hummus I love it), edamame, ice cream (an expert Doc recommends a

bowl of ice cream). Make sure it is the person's favorite (mine is butter pecan).

- Make healthy smoothies. Add nut butter, avocado slice, some spinach and wheat germ (a winner).
- Add lots of color to meals. Important. Make it look super. But very small portions, otherwise it is intimidating to the person which could be you. Eat the same meal right with the person. This is my brainstorm. Important. Smaller meals, more often is helpful. Gradually make changes.
- Try Boost or Ensure. These drinks are not a substitute for a meal and are not a complete source of nutrition. But, they do provide vitamins and minerals. I suggest Boost (I like the Chocolate Sensation with 15g of protein-Yes!). I take it daily with my vitamins. The vits seem to go down easier.
- Pump in protein and calcium...however you can do it. That person (maybe you) will suddenly buck up. Don't forget protein is the main building block of our body. Needs: Men = 56g daily; women = 46g. DRI (Dietary Nutrition Intake) calls for 0.36g per pound of weight. More protein is needed if active.
- Exercise. If you have joint pains or using a power chair or wheelchair, water aerobics is best. Docs agree with this 100%.
- "Hang in there, Chuck E2 CCQ"

TOF's TIPS #85

11/8/2017

Scribe is on a roll. Here is **TOF's TIPS #85**. "Pacemakers treat fatigue, light headedness, dizziness, and fainting. You might want one if you have an abnormal heart beat, congestive heart disease, or afib. It takes about 3 hours to insert a pacemaker. I have one and can't even remember the surgery...it was so simple. Outpatient. It's great because, in my case, my heart rate is not allowed to go below 70 beats/minute. If it does, the pacemaker kicks in.

"The pacemaker is composed of a small titanium encased pulse generator that contains a lithium battery. Batteries last from 5-15 years depending on how active the pacemaker is. Average battery life is 7-8 years. It only takes 1-2 hours to change the generator battery. Usually the original leads (connected to the heart) do not have to be replaced.

"You can exercise with no difficulty---walking, running, cycling, swimming. I still compete in the Senior Olympics. Nobody knows I have a pacemaker and I never even think about it.

"If you have a pacemaker and want to know symptoms of your pacemaker failure, here they are: dizziness, fainting, palpitations, shortness of breath, twitching of muscles in chest. Mine has never failed and I don't know of anyone who has had it fail. Keep in pace with the rest of us by getting a pacemaker (if you need it). Talk to your Doc. Hang in there. **Chuck E2 CCQ** "

And more from Paul Ruud D2 CCQ

Paul provided the info from Jim Tilley and had this ending: "The family and class were represented by Jan Keyes and their daughter Jennifer, Bob McCann D2, Bill Gillette/Nancy D2, Ed Ofgant/Marisa D2, Gary Roosma/Jill H2 and Sally Kurtz and me (Jim Tilley).

Prostate Cancer and the roles within 1958 on this subject for **John Brinson C2** and **Stan Bacon I2** from an exchange of emails between them and shared with class forum. Stan: "To view the latest updated PC Diagnosis Distribution Table posted for us by **Dale Cockle I2** on our PC Support website, go to http://www.west-point.org/class/usma1958-pc/>.

"It shows the distribution over time of our 87 known diagnoses. While we remain below the national average and new cases have steadily declined since the latest peak in 2006, we continue to be assaulted—one more diagnosis so far this year, and the threat persists.

"That 87 total may be understated. We thought we had a fair handle on the number, but we continue to be surprised with ones we hadn't known about. Your help in our keeping stats accurate and our providing support where requested will be greatly appreciated and treated confidentially.

"The Class PC Support Group places emphasis on prevention up front and support after the fact in working through one's diagnosis, treatment selection and post treatment issues—all dealt with in confidence. Let's be really careful out there."

John: "Great job. You have led the way for other Classes as well. All of us owe you a bunch of gratitude for helping so many West Pointers deal with prostate cancer."

Stan: "Thanks for the kind words, John. But recall it was you who took me by the hand and taught me the difference between a DRE and a PSAT and what all the group needed in the way of support. 'We who rise to new heights stand on the shoulders of giants.'"

John: "Thanks, but truth be known, you get all the credit for this great project, a project that has helped so many West Pointers deal with prostate cancer."
