Clearly, everything is coming together with the remarkable successes of both the Hubbell and Webb scopes in orbits, the creation of and high level of interest in the Space Force, and the number of astronaut graduates. I like to think that the Cadet Astronomy Club which had very humble beginnings has grown along with the Space Physics & Astronomy curricula as we enter a new **Golden Age of Astronomy**. All of which makes our decision to endow an **Astronomy Award** all the timelier."



Evan had a mission to scatter some of his father-in-law's ashes on the Pebble Beach Golf Course; and Jody gave us a cook's tour of the entire area, sharing great time and stories with us. Of special interest was an on-going project Jody had undertaken on

behalf of the Del Monte Forest Conservancy, for which Jody is currently serving as President. The conservancy owns and protects several parcels totaling over 200-acres inside Pebble Beach, with the purpose of maintaining them in perpetuity for the public good. Jody's special interest for several years has been to restore and to protect for all future time this iconic seaside "cottage" pictured, designed and constructed about a century ago by an adventuresome artist who later donated it to the Conservancy. The years and weather had accomplished their damage, and there were questions as to the efficacy of restoring and sustaining the home.

Of particular interest, and critical maintenance need..., was the exceptional artistic roof pictured, which was made with various colored rectangles of placed 'thin-concrete' roofing. Jody provided hands-on leadership and management in carefully recording the dimensions and coloration of each rectangle for accurate historic recreation, using also thin-set concrete and modern technology practices, assuring it exactly replicated the original. He also provided active 'jungle-clearing' of the wild growth surrounding the cottage, and historic upgrade of the insides. The cottage is now returned to full usage and is rented as a revenue stream to facilitate other conservancy support purposes. Of classmate interest was Jody's sharing and admitting that he

finally put to constructive use the surveying skills he learned as a cadet, I believe surprising himself of his able skills, and of their importance to such projects. I assured him we'd make him an Honorary Engineer.

All of us from the Class who were able to share and enjoy Jody's second Mini in 2016 wish to express again our thanks and appreciation for a superb occasion. And Evan expresses his thanks for 'mission-accomplished' with the ashes..."
