

WEST POINT

The United States Military Academy at West Point, New York, the nation's oldest service academy, has been in the forefront of American educational institutions since its establishment by Act of Congress on March 16, 1802.

During the American Revolution, General Washington among others recognized the strategic importance of West Point in preventing British control of the Hudson River and the consequent splitting of the colonies.

West Point was first occupied by militia troops in 1775; and a Regular Army garrison was established here on January 20, 1778, making West Point the oldest, continuously-occupied military post in the country.

The selection of West Point as the site of the national Military Academy was a natural one, for the rugged terrain itself suggests a battlement.

In the 162 years since its founding, more than 25,000 young men have been graduated. The Cadets are drawn from all sections of the country and from varying economic, national, ethnic, and religious backgrounds — representative of the population of the United States.

These Cadets receive the equivalent of a five-year college education — four years of academic instruction and a year of military training spread over their four summers at West Point.

Two academic programs are offered at the Military Academy: the Standard Academic Program, the basic minimum requirement for graduation, consisting of a prescribed core curriculum plus two electives taken by each Cadet in his final year; and the *Advanced Studies Program* comprised of advanced and augmented versions of nearly all the standard courses, plus additional electives.

About 60% of the curriculum is devoted to the mathematics/science/engineering subjects and the remainder to the social sciences/humanities.

The authorized strength (enrollment) of the Corps of Cadets is set by law. In 1802 it was ten; a decade later it was raised to 250; and in

recent years it has been 2529.

On March 3, 1964, President Johnson signed into law Congressional legislation raising the total enrollment at all three service academies to 4417. This increase will be effected at the Military Academy in gradual stages over a period of about ten years. As the enrollment progressively increases, expanded facilities will be required. A ten-year building plan is being implemented, as well as action to increase the strength of the staff and faculty beginning with the academic year 1965-66.

Thus, the Military Academy continues to fulfill its mission of providing, on the college level, an academic education leading to the Bachelor of Science degree and a military education leading to a commission as

an officer in the Regular Army.

ARMY ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION

The Army Athletic Association is a self-supporting organization composed primarily of some 13,000 West Point graduates. Practically all of the Association's income is derived from football game receipts.

Neither the taxpayer's money nor government appropriations are used to support the Academy's intercollegiate athletic program.

Each member of the Association is assessed annual dues. This fee entitles the member to seniority ticket privileges and information on athletic activities.

The annual budget for the Association totals upwards of a million dollars. After it is approved by the Superintendent of the Military Academy, it is administered by the Director of Athletics.

An Athletic Board, composed of five senior officers on active duty and presently stationed at West Point, serves as an advisory council to the Superintendent on policy pertaining to intercollegiate athletics.

The Association finances 18 varsity sports, maintains the athletic facilities, provides supplies and equipment, employs the required coaching and administrative staff, and supports in part extracurricular activities of the Corps of Cadets. This financial support does not involve Federal appropriations.



THREE TEAMS FOR 75th GRID YEAR

Army returns to three-team football again this fall as the U. S. Military Academy goes into its 75th year of intercollegiate competition. So back come the Regulars, a unit which will play both ways, the defensive-minded Bandits and the attack group, tabbed the Go-Team.

There were many problems facing Coach Paul Dietzel and his staff when they went into spring practice, among the more important being the selection of personnel. To find the 33 starters, and that is what they are considered to be at West Point, there had to be some screening much beyond the 15 returning lettermen.

The process was interesting and the results won't be evident until the '64 season gets underway. The top 11 players were picked for the Regulars. That produced an all-letterman outfit with an all-senior back-

field.

Carl "Rollie" Stichweh from Williston Park, N. Y., who proved to be the answer to Army's quarterback problem last fall, will be back for his final year. In the backfield with Stichweh will be John Seymour at tailback. The Berkley, Mich., senior was the leading Cadet ground gainer in 1962. He alternated at tailback and wingback last fall. Don Parcells from Oradell, N. J., who was used both as a fullback and a wingback last season, has settled into the fullback assignment. Rounding out the quartet will be John Johnson from Winnsboro, S. C. Johnson clinched

the starting wingback assignment last year only to be injured in the

opener and miss the rest of the 10-game slate.

Along the line are veterans, three seniors and four juniors. The ends and tackles all started against Navy last December. Bill Sherrell of Rome, N. Y., and Sam Champi of East Orange, N. J., are the wingmen and Bill Zadel of Mt. Prospect, Ill., and John Carber of Langhorne, Pa., are the tackles. They all stand tall, 6-4 or better, and weigh 220 pounds or over, giving Army experience and size on that part of the line. Sherrell and Zadel are seniors, Champi and Carber juniors.

The biggest rebuilding problem came in the center of the line with the departure of the starting center and both guards via graduation. Ron Butterfield of West Springfield, Mass., who was the No. 2 pivotman until he was hurt in the Penn State game, has come back as the top center. Pete Braun, who filled Butterfield's spot the remainder of the 1963 season, has been switched to guard and joins Sonny Stowers, Army's No. 2 guard last fall, on the Regular line. Butterfield is a senior, the guards are juniors.

With only four other lettermen returning, the bulk of the 22 players on the two specialist teams were determined by the 20-session spring workout. Tony Pyrz of Argo, Ill., should move back into his defensive quarterback slot and Curt Lindler from Columbia, S. C., is a leading contender for the fullback job, both Bandit backfield chores. Jim Hennen, who lettered at end in 1962, is battling Billy Sims, a junior from Nederland, Tex., for one of the Bandit guard spots. Hennen was a guard in high school in Chattanooga.

Three sophomores may move into the Bandit unit. David Rivers of Richmond, Ky., and Tom Schwartz of St. Paul, Minn., are prime candidates for the ends spots, while Townsend Clarke of Newport, R. I., looks

like a center choice.

Ray Hawkins, the 15th returning letter winner, is listed as the wingback on the Go-Team with Bruce Andrise, a junior from Mt. Prospect,

Ill., giving him a tussle for the berth.

Newcomers play the big role on the offensive specialist unit, no less than five getting the opening nod in the spring game. Last year's freshmen included end Barry Nickerson of Miami, Fla.; tackle Mike Neuman from Grand Rapids, Mich.; guard John Montanaro of White Plains, N. Y.; tailback Mark Hamilton of St. Petersburg, Fla., and fullback Don Dietz of Little Rock, Ark.

Graduation also wrecked havoc with Army's kicking game, a top weapon in the Cadet grid arsenal. Both the No. 1 punter and placement

kicker graduated. The new faces have yet to be determined.

GAME CAPTAINS

Game captains will be used again this fall, a senior starter being named by Coach Dietzel to lead the Army team in each of the first nine games. Then the team members will select the Navy game captain, who will be officially recognized before the Navy game as the Army captain for 1964.



PAUL F. DIETZEL
Head Coach

The responsibility of molding the Army football personnel into a representative team rests with Paul F. Dietzel, head football coach at the United States Military Academy.

Starting his third year as head coach at West Point, the dynamic young man from Mansfield, Ohio, faces one of the heaviest schedules in

the history of the Academy. A meeting with national champion Texas in Austin in early October, games with the other five powerhouses in the East (including Navy) and intersectional frays with four other top caliber teams present a real test for the Army 1964 edition.

Coach Dietzel is the 25th head mentor for West Point as the Military Academy enters its 75th year of football. His record during the first two years was 13-7.

This is Coach Dietzel's third assignment at West Point. He had a year as Plebe (freshman) coach under Earl (Red) Blaik in 1948 and two more as varsity line coach under Blaik in the 1953 and 1954 seasons.

He brought his own style of play — the famous three-team concept — with him in 1962 only to have an NCAA substitution ruling knock it out last fall. But another rule change returns the three teams to West Point for 1964.

Two other factors of football influence his type of grid warfare — ball-control and the kicking game. He knows that the other team can't score if they don't have the ball, so his teams play possession. Also, as shown the past two years, the field goal and the long punt are top offensive weapons and can produce victories.

Born in Fremont, Ohio, Coach Dietzel attended Mansfield High School and then Miami University at Oxford, Ohio. There he was a little all-America center and captain of the football team. He played in the Sun Bowl at El Paso, Tex., in 1948, just prior to his graduation with honors from Miami.

World War II temporarily halted his college career and he served as a B-29 pilot in the Pacific theater, flying 12 combat missions.

His coaching career, started in 1948 at West Point, continued under Sid Gilman at Cincinnati in 1949 and 1950 and with Bear Bryant at Kentucky in 1951 and 1952.


He went from the Military Academy to Louisiana State in 1955 and in seven years his Bayou Bengals won 46 games, lost 24 and tied 3. His teams won the National and Southeastern titles in 1958 and were co-champions of the Southeast in 1961. He was Coach-of-the-Year in 1958 as his team beat Clemson, 7-0, in the 1959 Sugar Bowl. He lost to Mississippi in the 1960 Sugar Bowl, but beat Colorado in the 1961 Orange Bowl.

His overall coaching record is now 59 victories, 31 defeats and 3 ties.

Mr. Dietzel is married to the former Ann Wilson. Their two children, Steve (15) and Kathy (11) were both born at West Point.

ASSOCIATE COACHES

GEORGE TERRY



This fall marks the third season at West Point for George Terry. In addition to serving as the chief aide to Coach Paul Dietzel, he is responsible for molding the defensive strategy and coordinating the defensive backs.

A veteran of nearly 30 years in the coaching ranks, he has been associated with high school, collegiate and professional teams. Prior to coming to West Point with Coach Dietzel in 1962, George was at Louisiana State University for eight seasons.

George got his start in the coaching profession in the high school system at


Pine Bluff, Ark., and later moved to Greenville, Miss., to assume the head duties there. His professional experience includes pre-season assignments

with the Ottawa Rough Riders of the Canadian League.

He attended George Washington University, and in 1933 was graduated from the College of the Ozarks, where he lettered in football three years. He earned his Masters Degree in Health and Physical Education at the University of Arkansas.

A native of Batesville, Ark., George is married and has one son.

SHALOSKY BILL



While his primary responsibility rests with the offensive line, Shalosky is also kept busy tutoring the guards. As an undergraduate at the University of Cincinnati, he was coached by Paul Dietzel, then the line coach under George Blackburn. Bill was regarded by Dietzel as "probably the finest lineman I ever coached."


This will be Shalosky's fifth season with Dietzel. In 1960 Bill accepted a position at Louisiana State as offensive line coach, and two years later moved to West Point.

Shalosky graduated from the University of Cincinnati in 1953 after excelling on the gridiron for three seasons with the Bearcats. He was named to the all-Ohio team, and received honorable mention all-America honors his senior year.

Upon graduation, Bill immediately broke into the coaching ranks as an assistant under Plebe coach Doc Blanchard at West Point. In 1955 he returned to his alma mater for a five-year stint as a line coach.

LARRY JONES



Currently in his eighth season as a member of the coaching profession, Jones also serves a dual responsibility at West Point — heading up the defensive line and the tackles.

Larry played three years of varsity football under Coach Paul Dietzel at Louisiana State University, where he was a standout center. Immediately after graduation in 1954, he joined the LSU staff as an assistant freshman coach, and has been with Dietzel ever since.

Following the 1955 season, Jones took a two-year leave of absence to serve as a 1st Lieutenant in the U. S. Air

Force. Upon completion of his military duty, he returned to Baton Rouge as the varsity line coach for the Bayou Bengals. When Dietzel accepted the coaching assignment at West Point in 1962, Jones accompanied him here.

Eager to pursue his educational career, he took advantage of the excellent facilities at Louisiana State, and in 1961 earned his Masters Degree in Education.

A native of Little Rock, Ark., Larry is married and has two sons.

JIM VALEK



Since the 1960 season, when he became a member of the grid staff, Jim Valek has been the Army end coach. This fall he takes on a new assignment — handling the offensive backfield.

A graduate of the University of Illinois in 1948, he has had 15 years experience in the coaching profession, eight of which have been at the collegiate level.

Prior to coming to West Point, Jim served as the end coach at Illinois under Ray Eliot and Pete Elliott, respectively. He held the same position on the University of Wichita staff for four years

in his initial coaching berth out of college.

Jim lettered four times as a defensive end for the Fighting Illini while winning all-Big Ten honors, and was a member of the Illinois team that defeated UCLA in the 1947 Rose Bowl.

A native of Joliet, Ill., he is married and has two children.

TAD SCHROEDER



Although this is Schroeder's first season on the varsity front at West Point, he is no stranger to the Army style of play. He has served as an associate Plebe coach for the past two seasons, and this fall will handle the quarterbacks for Coach Dietzel.

Tad played for the University of Cincinnati during the 1957 season, then was a student assistant the following two years. Upon his graduation in 1960, he was elevated to the varsity staff be-

fore coming to West Point.

While at Cincinnati he received his Bachelor of Arts degree from the Col-

lege of Arts and Sciences. In 1960 he earned his L.L.B. degree from the

College of Law, also at Cincinnati.

A native of Cincinnati, Tad spent six months in the U. S. Marine Corps in 1960-61. Upon his discharge from active duty, he worked for five months in the Cincinnati Baseball Club business office during the World Series.

BILL ROWE



A 1959 graduate of the U. S. Military Academy, Rowe returns to West Point as the newest member of Coach Dietzel's staff. He will tutor the centers and linebackers.

As an undergraduate at West Point, Bill won three varsity letters as a center on the football team. His senior year he was presented the Thomas W. Hammond award, given annually to the outstanding lineman, and was named to several all-East teams. He also participated in the 1959 North-South game.

For three years, 1960 through 1962, he was an assistant coach at West Point

under Plebe mentor Tom Cahill. He resigned his commission in 1962, and accepted a coaching assignment at the Manlius School. While there he coached three sports — football, wrestling and track.

Bill is at present a captain in the reserves. A native of Carlisle,

Pa., he is married and has three children.

TOM CAHILL Plebe Coach



A member of the Army Athletic Association staff since 1959, he serves in the dual capacity of Plebe football and baseball coach. He also fills scouting assignments for the varsity.

A veteran of twelve years of coaching in the high and prep school ranks, he served alternately at the Manlius School and Riverdell Regional High in

Oradell, N. I.

A graduate of Washington State, where he received his Bachelor of Science and Bachelor of Education degrees, Ed was active in sports as a halfback and sprinter. He earned his Masters Degree at Columbia University.

A native of Ellensburg, Wash., he is married and has three children.


