## Why We're Here

The American WWII Orphans Network (AWON) was founded in 1991 by Ann Bennett Mix. Her father, Sydney W. Bennett, was killed in action by a sniper in Mongiorgio, Italy on April 19, 1945, when Ann was four years old.


AWON's first goal was to find other World War II orphans. The federal government did not keep statistics on children born to U.S. servicemen killed or missing in action from World War II. It is estimated that at least 183,000 American children lost their fathers in the service during the war. Ann started finding them, one by one. The first orphans she found provided seed money and support and became AWON's First Founders.

Today, more than 20 years after its founding, AWON is still the only organization in which World War II orphans get support and friendship from other orphans. Our members say we feel like a family, and we are! We grew up without our fathers, many of us barely knowing more than his name. AWON brings us together to learn about our fathers' service and to honor their memory.

AWON welcomes all family members who lost an American serviceman in World War II. Read on to learn more about AWON's accomplishments and ongoing activities aimed at honoring those to whom we owe so much.

# What We Do

In terms of human life, World War II was the costliest war ever fought by Americans on foreign soil. At war's end, 16 million had served and 417,000 had died, including 73,000 who are still missing in action. Their deaths left approximately 183,000 children fatherless and designated war orphans by the Veterans Administration.

As Americans celebrated the 60th anniversary of the end of World War II, war orphans reached middle age. For many, the sacrifice did not stop with the end of the war in 1945, as some still live with unanswered questions and unresolved grief as a result of their still missing father.

For 20 years AWON has worked to educate the public about our fathers' service and sacrifice. As America's World War II orphans, we've been the driving force behind the Freedom Wall - the wall of gold stars at the National WWII Memorial; presenting Memorial Day wreaths at all 16 World War II American Cemeteries overseas, as well as several national cemeteries stateside, and creating and maintaining the only database of American fathers killed or missing during World War II, and of the orphans who honor them.

If you're a World War II orphan or family member, join us as we continue to find ways to honor those in our families who paid the ultimate price for the freedom we all enjoy.
